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## 'Cinematics' draws diverse talent

## The annual film and photography festival brings in widespread entries and viwers

**Mysore:** The 2014 'Cinematics,' an annual event for movie lovers and photographers, saw a popular turnout at the Shri Dharmasthala Manjunatheshwara Institute for Management Development (SDMIMD) recently.

The Short Movie category attracted entries across India and was judged by Dr Kiran Thotambailu, a doctor by profession and reknowned Kannada film producer and Harsha Shetty, a graduate of the London-based Film School. The Wheel, a Bengali film directed by Subhadipta Biswas and Arijit Mitra, was deemed the best and won the first place. It raises concerns on issues of gender, domination, isolation, economic class implications and the cultural degradation of our contemporary climate.

U Turn, a Kannada film directed by Madan Ramvenkatesh, bagged the second place. Bringing up the rear end of the shortlisted were movies like Lemon Candy by Kannan Kodoth, Che by
